#### LATE PAYMENTS:

Please be aware that the office staff are spending a huge amount of time chasing up payments for lunchtime meals, extra-curricular clubs and activities, visits and music tuition. This is hugely time consuming and we would ask for your help with making this improve please.

Parents and carers can help massively to make this situation become less of a problem by ensuring that payments are made by the date requested.

Extra-curricular activities are usually over-subscribed now and late payment (where payment is required) may result in your child losing their place. Payment <u>MUST</u> be made before the first session.

Likewise lunch payments <u>MUST</u> be made in advance of a meal being taken.

### **SCHOOL UNIFORM REMINDER:**

Trainers and boots are NOT part of our school uniform and should not be worn on a daily basis. Children should ONLY wear black shoes in school. Trainers may be worn for appropriate sporting activities only. Children are welcome to wear boots to and from school on rainy / snowy days, but these must be changed when they enter their cloak or classrooms.

# **GOVERNORS' CORNER:**

LIFE WAS MUCH EASIER WHEN Apple AND BLACKBERRY WERE JUST FRUITS I heard a phrase on the radio last week that really struck a chord: apparently I'm a *digital immigrant*. This means that I have come to technology later in life. *Digital natives*, however, are the younger generations who were born into a world of modern technology and who seem to have a fearless attitude towards it. So where does this leave us digital immigrants, other than watching with a mixture of desperation and awe

as our children navigate their way around apps and computer games that we can't even pronounce, never mind download? I try to explain to my children what life was like when I was growing up: one telephone in the house that was attached to the wall in the dining room, computer games that got no more exciting than Space Invaders and Pacman (not that we actually had a computer), and one family television where someone had to stand up and manually change the channel. It's fair to say that childhood today doesn't look much like that. And my point? Maybe life was easier when Apple and Blackberry were just fruits, but technology is one of our 'five-a-day' now and it's something that teachers and parents must deal with. Secondary schools have given up the battle of banning mobile phones from school sites and must try to manage their use within school, and primaries, as we know from Newburgh, are spending more and more time dealing with the fall-out of technology use out of school hours. As for parents, just as we need to teach our children good routines for eating properly, sleeping well and interacting with others, we need to teach them boundaries for their technical devices: when it's okay to use them, how to use them sensibly, and, of course, how to turn them off.
