Dear parents,

A key skill for children to acquire and develop in school is to learn to read. Adults in school are focused on improving children's fluency when reading and they would really appreciate your help with this

Our reading target is for children to read three times per week. However, for fluency to really improve, this needs to be more like five times per week. Each reading session doesn't have to be overly long - ten minutes quality time would be sufficient, but it is the repetition and repeated nature of reading more often which will help to improve your children's reading fluency.

Obviously all children are reading at different levels, dependant on their ages and previous experiences. However, the more we can foster a love for books and for reading, the better children will perform. A key question which staff are frequently asked is not about how well children are able to read, more along the lines of what sort of reading culture is there in the classroom and how much do children read or enjoy books for pleasure.

Staff in school are experienced practitioners who can offer support or advice about improving reading fluency and developing a love for books. If you have any questions about this, please approach and speak to one of them.

PARFNTPAY

May we please ask for your support in ensuring that sufficient payment is made in advance to your child/ren's ParentPay lunch accounts. DOGS ON THE SCHOOL SITE:

If you feel that you have no other alternative than to bring a dog onto the site, please telephone the school office and we will make alternative arrangements. This obviously does not apply to guide dogs or dogs providing support to their owners in other ways.

UNACCEPTABLE BEHAVIOUR:

Sadly we are finding that more and more staff in school are being verbally abused on any given day. This is not acceptable behaviour for any person, and no member of staff in school should be subjected to this. All staff working in school aim to ensure that children and families are treated fairly and with dignity. We may not always get things 100% right all of the time, but to be subjected to some things we have recently is not acceptable. Please think before resorting to this type of behaviour.

NUT ALLERGIES:

A reminder to all parents that we have a number of children in school with severe nut allergies. If these children come into contact with nuts of any form the consequences will be extremely serious. Please help us to minimise this risk by not including any nuts in lunch boxes, including peanut butter.























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Please remember our responsibilities to ourselves and our children when driving or parking around the school site.

This is especially important where children and parents are crossing Kipling Avenue to enter school.

Please note that children should be arriving at school at 8.45am at the earliest.

EASTER CREATIONS:

I hope that everyone has received a letter over the last week or so about changes we have made to the opportunities we are giving children at Easter this year. In previous years we have invited children to make Easter bonnets, gardens scenes etc. We will be changing this for Easter 2018 to something which we feel will have more of an impact for the whole school and the school site in particular. Activities which we are inviting children to complete this year are as follows:

<u>Reception</u> children are invited to decorate a wellington boot and plant some flowers in them.

<u>Year 1</u> children are invited to find some flat stones and paint them brightly to make some garden bugs.

<u>Year 2</u> children are invited to create some simple birdseed ornaments which can be hung from the trees on our school field.

Year 3 & 4 children are invited to decorate a plant pot in whatever way they see fit and to plant some flowers or bulbs in the pots so these can be enjoyed around the school site.

Year 5 & 6 children are invited to create a home for an animal. This may be a birdhouse or hedgehog house which we can then use around the site to encourage wildlife to live there.

There will be no judging of entries this year as we feel that this is something where everyone will be a 'winner' because the school site will look amazing as a result.

We would ask that any creations should be made <u>AT HOME</u> please (they will not be made in school) and brought into school during the final week of this term – the week commencing Monday 26th March 2018. This may seem like a long way off, but hopefully by sending this information out early it will give you chance to prepare some fantastic creations!
