
#### LIBRARY CLOSURE

# BOOK SOME TIME - My Hidden Chimp by Professor Steve Peters

My Hidden Chimp is an educational book for children to work through with an adult or by themselves. The book offers parents, teachers and carers some ideas and thoughts about how to help children to develop healthy habits for life. It assists children in understanding their emotions and dealing with anxiety and has become a huge hit with families.



Set out in a comic/activity book style, it's a fun, interactive read that children will love to share.

My Hidden Chimp is from the bestselling author of The Chimp Paradox and the creator of the chimp management mind model.

The book simplifies the neuroscience of the mind for children to understand and includes fun exercises and activities to help them think habits through and start putting them into practice.

Steve shows readers how 10 habits can help children to understand and manage their emotions and behaviour.

His accompanying adult book - The Silent Guides - is for grown ups to read to understand their own minds and to support their children reading My Hidden Chimp.

# GOVERNORS' CORNER - Karen Turner, Staff Governor

Last week I had the privilege of accompanying Y6 to Wales for their residential. Here is a glimpse of our week:

Day 1: Just after lunch we arrived at the centre and spent our afternoon kayaking at the lake, some capsized, some learnt to paddle, some could turn circles, and all of us were wet! Later, was a night hike over gentle rolling hills, crossing bogs, jumping over streams and sliding around covered in mud.



Day 2: We biked along a tow path next to a canal, all 16 of us in a neat snake to our lunch stop followed by learning to paddle an Indian canoe back to the rendezvous. In the evening along with the midges we practiced our map skills to follow an orienteering course.

Day 3: Kitted up in helmets and a harness, we scaled the climbing wall, jumped off a perfectly good ledge to catch a cargo net and dropped through a hole to abseil down to the ground. In the afternoon we learnt about indoor caving; we crawled through what can only be described as drain pipes and wooden transport crates. On the fourth journey, the lights were switched off and the children worked as an amazing team to find their way through.

Day 4: A proper challenge for me- outdoor caving! Dressed in fetching boiler suits, we reached the mouth of the cave and the instructor pointed to a very small opening that we were to army commando through. We crawled and hoisted ourselves through a range of tunnels and passageways. The children showed immense resilience and determination. After lunch we rock climbed in a quarry and abseiled over the cliff edge.

Day 5: The last morning was a lovely walk up a hill where we reminisced on the week of adventures.
