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

GOVERNORS' CORNER - Anna Meredith (Co-opted governor)

okay, but what do you DO?

We have three main types of governors on our governing body: staff governors, parent governors and, the largest group of all, co-opted governors. The latter are individuals who are invited onto the governing body because they have a particular skill set or contribution to make that is valuable to the group, whether they have children at Newburgh or not. At the end of last term we acquired a vacancy for a co-opted governor and we found ourselves in the enviable position of actually having a choice of people who want to come and work alongside with us in supporting Newburgh School. Governors are the biggest volunteer group nationally and it seems that it's becoming an increasingly popular choice for people in different areas of work to get involved with their local community through schools' governing bodies. What was particularly interesting was that, when meeting prospective governors, we needed to explain what it is that we actually do, and that provided an interesting opportunity for reflection, not only on the time commitment that's necessary but also the enthusiasm and investment that comes with the role. And then last week we met for our annual business meeting where we decide the roles we'll undertake throughout the year. Not only will we oversee the progress of the school's Learning Improvement Plan (LIP), to be presented by Mrs Simpkins at October's meeting, but we are all attached to different areas of the school: attendance, health and safety, special educational needs, finance, pupil premium, training, safeguarding...On top of our scheduled governor meetings and time in school to discuss and observe in action the LIP, we also meet regularly with designated staff regarding our key areas. So when we're asked, 'Okay, but what do you do?' the answer is, quite a lot really!
