Risk Assessment and plans updated for September 2021

The following document sets out how we, at Newburgh Primary School, will balance delivering a broad and balanced curriculum with the measures needed to minimise the risks of coronavirus (COVID-19) transmission.

We appreciate that there will be many concerns and points of view and understand that the way different schools implement the requirements will differ based on their individual circumstances. We have made judgments, following Government, union and Local Authority advice and taking account of feedback from pupils, parents and staff, at a school level about how to balance minimising any risks from coronavirus (COVID-19) by maximising control measures with providing a full educational experience for our pupils.

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Public health		
A requirement that people who are ill stay at home	 Pupils, staff and other adults must not come into the school if they have coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms, or have tested positive in at least the last 10 days, and anyone developing those symptoms during the school day will be sent home. Public Health England is clear that routinely taking the temperature of pupils is not recommended as this is an unreliable method for identifying coronavirus (COVID-19). If you have one of the top three symptoms, self-isolate and book a test. If you are unwell – as before Coronavirus - remain home, whilst highly symptomatic. 	
Robust hand and respiratory hygiene	Pupils will clean their hands regularly, including when they arrive at school, when they return from breaks, when they change rooms and before and after eating. Regular and thorough hand cleaning is going to be needed for the foreseeable future. Good respiratory hygiene by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach continues to be very important so we will ensure that enough tissues and bins are available in the school to support pupils and staff to follow this routine.	
Enhanced cleaning arrangements	 Cleaning schedule ensures cleaning is enhanced and includes: more frequent cleaning of rooms and shared areas frequently touched surfaces being cleaned more often than normal toilets cleaned regularly and pupils encouraged to clean their hands thoroughly after using the toilet 	
Active engagement with NHS Test and Trace	 Schools must ensure that staff members and parents/carers understand that they will need to be ready and willing to: book a test if they or their child are displaying symptoms. 	

	 provide details of anyone they or their child have been in close contact with if they were to test positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) or if asked by NHS Test and Trace to self-isolate if they have been in close contact with someone who tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19), or if anyone in their household develops symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) Staff engage with twice weekly Lateral Flow Testing. For Primary school aged pupil, routine lateral flow testing (LFT) is being
	recommended by way of at-home testing and not in the setting, therefore test kits will not be issued to primary schools. Testing of primary school aged pupils is not mandatory but routine testing of pupils is encouraged across all settings (at home), especially now in the absence of close contact isolations
Reduce contacts and maximise	Mixing and 'bubbles'
distancing between those in school wherever possible	 It is no longer recommend that it is necessary to keep children in consistent groups ('bubbles'). This means that bubbles will not need to be used in Educational Settings from the autumn term.
and minimise potential for	 Individual and very frequently used equipment, such as pencils and pens will be provided by the school and must not be brought in from home.
contamination so far as is reasonably practicable	 It is recommended that pupils limit the amount of equipment they bring into school each day, to essentials such as lunch boxes, hats, coats, books. Small bags (to avoid too much space being used in the corridors) are allowed. Parents should still observe social distancing rules when dropping or waiting for their child and to leave the school grounds in a timely and orderly manner. Groups must not stop and chat on the premises or outside of the school gates.

	 Face coverings are no longer advised for pupils, staff and visitors either in classrooms or in communal areas. The government has removed the requirement to wear face coverings in law but expects and recommends that they are worn in enclosed and crowded spaces where you may come into contact with people you don't normally meet, eg parent events in school. This includes public transport and dedicated transport to Educational Setting or college.
Transport	Parents, staff and pupils are encouraged to walk or cycle to school if at all possible.

	Curriculum, behaviour and pastoral support
Curriculum	 Education is not optional. All pupils receive a high-quality education that promotes their development and equips them with the knowledge and cultural capital they need to succeed in life. The curriculum remains broad and ambitious. All pupils continue to be taught a wide range of subjects, maintaining their choices for further study and employment. Remote education may need to be an essential component in the delivery of the school curriculum for some pupils, alongside classroom teaching, or in the case of a local lockdown.
Reception	For pupils in Reception, teachers will assess and address gaps in language, early reading and mathematics, particularly ensuring children's acquisition of phonic knowledge and extending their vocabulary. All groups of children will be given opportunities for outdoor learning.
KS1 and 2	For pupils in key stages 1 and 2, priority will be to identifying gaps and re-establish good progress in the essentials (phonics and reading, increasing vocabulary, writing and mathematics), identifying opportunities across the curriculum so they read widely, and developing their knowledge and vocabulary. The curriculum will remain broad, so that
